Restorative Practices at Benzie Central Schools

Restorative practices are a district wide approach that seeks to Building Respect, Responsibility, and Relationships, shifting the focus from blame to repair and responsibility.

What Are Restorative Practices?

Restorative practices focus on repairing harm and restoring relationships instead of assigning punishment. They help students build empathy, communication, and accountability by:

- Strengthening community and belonging
- Encouraging accountability and empathy
- Resolving conflict through dialogue
- Promoting emotional and social growth

Why Use Restorative Practices?

Consideration and use of Restorative Practices is required by Michigan Law. Elementary students are developing socially and emotionally. Restorative approaches help students navigate conflict, manage emotions, and develop self-awareness.

Benefits:

- Reduced suspensions and detentions
- Improved classroom climate
- Increased trust between students and staff
- Greater sense of fairness and inclusion

Core Components

- 1. Restorative Circles Group discussions that build trust and resolve issues through open communication.
- 2. Restorative Conversations One-on-one talks that promote understanding and repair harm.
- 3. Restorative Conferences Structured meetings that involve everyone affected by an incident.
- 4. Community-Building Activities Daily practices like check-ins, gratitude rounds, or reflections.

What Does a Restorative School Look Like?

- Students feel safe, heard, and valued.
- Teachers lead with empathy and fairness.
- Conflicts are learning opportunities.
- Relationships come first, discipline follows restoration.

When is a Restorative approach used?

Whenever building a sense of community will benefit the group through empathy and shared responsibility. Whenever a conflict happens where individuals or the whole group suffer. Restorative practices are used to repair the relationships and provide for a way for individuals and the group to heal and move forward.

Restorative Practices – Common Misconceptions

Misconception: Restorative practices don't hold students accountable; students can say or do anything without consequences.

Fact: Restorative practices take student accountability to a higher level. Students and teachers are engaged in collaborative conversations around choices so that students can understand the impact of their choices, value the relationships they have with peers and adults, and decide to embrace personal growth and change.

Misconception: Engaging in restorative practices instead of expulsion or suspension condones violent or extreme behavior.

Fact: Removing a student for extreme behavior only sends the problem somewhere else and does not solve the problem within the context that the problem occurred. Restorative practices provide students with a chance to change their behavior by providing the support they need to make lasting personal change.

Misconception: Students should come to school knowing how to behave appropriately.

Fact: Students come to school with experiences and personality traits that are forming before they enter school. By using restorative practices, students can experience and learn pro-social behaviors that will enhance the likelihood of their success in school and life, no matter their experiences or temperament.
